Help in times of disaster

Retooled cabinetry going in FEMA temp homes

With earthquakes, hurricanes and floods wreaking havoc at all points of the compass, Tennsco finds itself in a position to help displaced families for years to come.

Five mobile home manufacturers have banded together to order Tennsco metal kitchen cabinetry that will be installed in homes destined for recipients of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's relief help.

Sales staff member Crystal Proctor said the consortium of trailer manufacturers first contacted Tennsco about two years ago, after searching for

metal furniture manufacturers on the internet.

Widely published reports of formaldehyde fumes buildup in previously manufactured homes led FEMA and manufacturers to seek metal versions of the cabinetry. The manufacturers were all in the South, Proctor said, and they liked Tennsco's proximity.

Two years later, the consortium re-contacted Tennsco and ordered 300 sets of kitchen cabinets – and the manufacturers wanted the initial

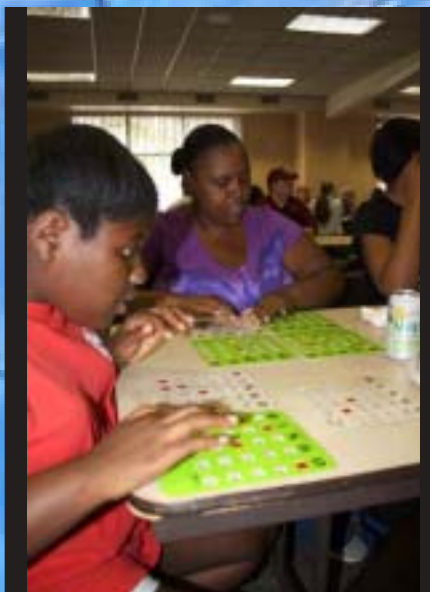

shipment in two weeks, said Vice President of Engineering Mike Webster. Employees had to work quickly because a design for the cabinets didn't exist.

The production was a group effort. Jacky Morris in Engineering designed the models using as many of Tennsco's standard product designs as possible. Plant 5 employees blanked some parts. Plant 1 employees formed the doors. Plant 2 employees did all welding and final assembly was accomplished at Plants 2 and 3.

Webster praised welding foreman Darryl Freshour and Tim Durham "who's been instrumental in working through some of the problems. He's the final assembler."

The scrambling didn't stop there. Due to the compressed turn-around time, no trucking company had capacity for shipping the products. Tennsco employees Stacy Hicks and Aaron DeBlock got behind the wheel and drove loads to Georgia and Alabama, respectively. "We wanted to make sure they got there in time," Webster said.

"I've really been impressed with how all the departments worked together and how quickly we were able to go from design stage to manufacturing. It's amazing how quickly everyone worked together to get this out the door," Webster said.

Tennsco President Stuart Speyer added his praise, too. "In every aspect, Tennsco really shined... All indications are that the current order, which has pushed our capabilities, is only a small taste of orders that will follow," he said. "I want to thank all of those who have made the extra effort to get this order done and done so well. I know it's been a challenge when you add something completely new on top of the regular flow of orders.

Webster said the order for 300 sets of kitchen was placed around the first of August. Two weeks later the initial shipment went out. The last of the order shipped at the end of August, just as the consortium requested.

Webster said each trailer supplied to FEMA will have to pass an air quality test of gas emissions. Tennsco will enable the trailers to pass the test – its metal products are Scientific Certification Systems (SCS) certified Indoor Advantage Gold which means they are deemed to put no Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) into the air which would be harmful (see *Nuts&Bolts* Fall 2010 issue).

The cabinets are being shipped to Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Texas.

"It's a good-sized order," Webster said. "It's nice because there is no color variation. Everything is the same."

The only difference he said are some models with bottom framing eliminated to accommodate someone in a wheelchair.

"It looks just like a kitchen cabinet... pretty durable with a painted finish," Webster said.

Proctor said she thought the completed mobile homes would be stockpiled until needed, but she wouldn't be surprised if they weren't sent to the Northeast for families displaced by Hurricane Irene flooding.

She called the process "amazing. Unfortunately, the work is tied to natural disasters. It's quite a task."

Proctor hopes this effort opens a new avenue of business, "like in the travel trailer business. It would be a nice niche product for us. New lines of business are always nice to have."

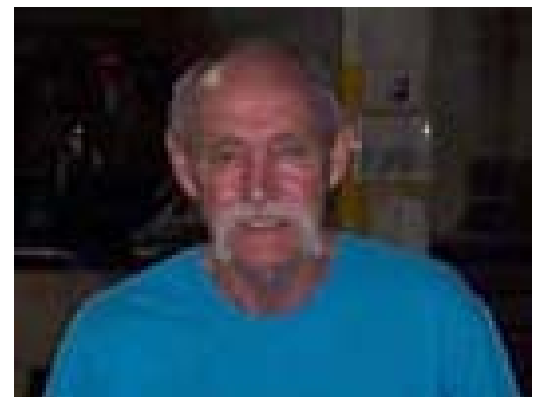

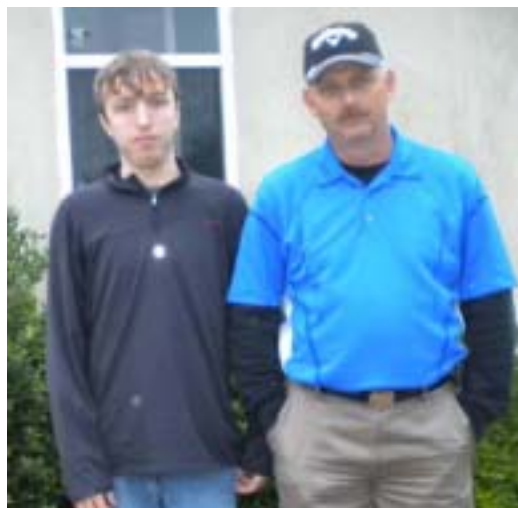

Scholar to study the physics of things

He graduated at the top, but Tennsco scholar Hudson Bilbrey still wants to climb higher.

Bilbrey is the 2011 recipient of the Tennsco Scholarship, a \$10,000 award given to a graduating senior from either Dickson County High School or Creek Wood High School. Each year the award is given to the student who best represents the Dickson County community in terms of scholarship, leadership and career goals.

Bilbrey, the son of Landel and Carolyn Bilbrey of White Bluff, graduated number one in his class at Creek Wood High School. This fall, he's attending Austin Peay State University with plans to major in physics. His goal is to continue on for master's and doctoral degrees. Bilbrey wants to do physics research "that will contribute to the betterment of the community," he stated.

The scholar graduated with a perfect 4.0 and a 32 out of 36 on the ACT test (the national average is 21).

Bilbrey was thankful for the scholarship.

"It's definitely a blessing. It meant a lot," he said, adding that the Tennsco awards will ensure he'll have enough funds for subsequent years of schooling.

"It came as a complete shock. Thank you (Tennsco) so much. I'm honored to

receive this scholarship."

Bilbrey already has an established science reputation. He's a past winner of the Dickson County science fair and the winner of the U.S. Achievement Academy National Sciences award. He has participated in the Tennessee Junior Science and Humanities Symposium, participated as a member of the Creek Wood Math Team, a UT Martin Science Quiz Bowl participant, and a participant in UT Knoxville's Engineers' Day for four years.

He's a leader, too. His senior year he served as marching and concert band

captain and a member of the Austin Peay State University Honor Band. He attended Tennessee American Legion Boys' State and was named a member of the state band. He used his musical skills to give back, too, by mentoring Charlotte Middle School band members, organizing multiple competitive instrumental ensembles and co-arranging music for the CWHS concert band.

Bilbrey was also active in community and church efforts raising funds to fight Cystic Fibrosis, helping landscape public areas volunteering at the Dickson Help Center.

As a Tennsco scholar, Bilbrey will receive four annual installments of \$2,500 provided he maintains a 3.0 grade point average in college. If Bilbrey earns a 3.5 GPA in any year, he will receive a \$750 bonus for the following year for a maximum possible award of \$12,250.



STILL STANDING ■ It'll take more than a rogue automobile to bring down Tennsco shelving. The driver of a car crashed through the garage door of this warehouse in Seattle and into Tennsco Z-line shelving that was eight levels high - more than 15 feet.
